### 2. Start Each Quarter off Right

- Login to JICS to register for classes, check your class schedules, print transcripts and more.

#### Register Early for Classes

- Meet with your advisor as soon as registration opens and register for classes early.

- Upcoming quarterly course offerings are available online at skc.edu
- You can also check your class schedule under the “For Students” tab at skc.edu.
- Review your course syllabi in Brightspace or the paper copy.
- Use a planner or the calendar on your phone to plan your college schedule:
  - Class times
  - Study and work schedules
  - Appointments with Instructors
  - Study and work schedules
  - Exam dates
  - Project and homework due dates
  - Time to read, study, and do homework

### 3. Take the Right Steps

- Make an appointment to speak with your instructor during office hours to ask questions and get help; do so before you are struggling.
- Get to know students in your classes. Form and attend study groups.

## 5. Plan Your Degree Path

### First-time new students

- Advisors will help navigate the transition into college, including investigating choices before selecting a certificate or degree program, sharing college preparation course information, core program requirements and how to access college support services.

### Continuing students

- Advisors serve as your 'graduation coach' and offer continued support focused on the successful completion of your chosen academic program.

- Meet with your Academic Advisor regularly (several times a quarter) to discuss campus resources and your graduation plan

- Register early as classes tend to fill up fast.
- Registration generally opens around the 6th week of each quarter
- Check your student email addresses regularly for SKC correspondence.

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at [fafsa.ed.gov](https://fafsa.ed.gov) to determine eligibility for financial aid money such as the Federal Pell Grant, Work Study, Direct Loans, and Scholarships.

- The FAFSA application is updated and available every year on Oct. 1st. SKC's School Code is **015023**.

- Financial aid application processing takes two to four weeks for you to be awarded. Some funds run out quickly, so apply early and follow up with the Financial Aid office.
- To retain financial aid eligibility, you must meet Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements, which include maintaining an overall 2.0 GPA and not failing or withdrawing from too many classes.

## 9. Pay for Classes

Pay your tuition and fees in full by the payment deadline. For deadlines or to set up a payment plan, visit the Business Office.

If you are approved for financial aid, confirm that your award is enough to cover the bill.

## 10. Plan your Budget

Creating and following a budget is an important part of being a successful student. The costs of being a student include not only expenses such as tuition and fees, housing, food, and transportation, but also books, supplies, and emergency expenses.



## 11. Graduate!

- Talk with your advisor each quarter about your intention to graduate so you can get help verifying you have met all degree requirements.
- Your advisor will assist you in completing your graduation application the quarter before you intend to graduate. Your advisor will perform a degree audit and ensure you have met all graduation requirements, including all required classes. Make sure you complete all required classes in your final quarters.
- Attend SKC's graduation Pow Wow in May to celebrate your achievement and receive a graduate tassel.
- Attend SKC's commencement ceremony in June. Participate in commencement, whether you graduate in the summer, fall, winter, or spring.
- Celebrate this achievement with friends, family and those who have supported you on your journey!

The Financial Aid Office will assist you with the federal funding available at SKC and the financial aid process to meet the cost of attendance for your college expenses. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is required to apply for grants, scholarships, work-study employment, and direct loans.

Complete the FAFSA online at [fafsa.ed.gov](https://fafsa.ed.gov). After submission of the FAFSA application, it can take 3-5 business days to process and 2-4 weeks to receive funds. After SKC receives your FAFSA, you will receive an email notification from the financial aid office to start the required documents to complete your file and determine eligibility for federal student aid. Students will need to follow up with the email and request documents. Documents required to determine your aid eligibility include financial aid forms and income documents (such as federal income tax transcripts and/or verification worksheets). Please call, email, or stop by for help with all of your financial aid questions.

SKC offers students many institutional and non-institutional scholarship opportunities. Scholarships can be based on financial need,

merit, or other criteria. Scholarships for SKC students include those funded by: SKC Employees Fund, American Indian College Fund, SKC Foundation, among others. These scholarships are to honor and promote academic excellence among SKC's present and potential students. Scholarship amounts vary depending on available funds. During the Winter Quarter Registration period in the year you will receive your certificate or degree (or the quarter preceding your final quarter), meet with your advisor so they can perform a degree audit and you can complete all graduation



application materials before submitting them to the Registrar's Office in the RDIII Building.

A degree audit must be completed by your Advisor and attached to your graduation application showing you have or will meet all requirements. It is essential to ensure that all substitutions, transfer credits, waivers, and other transcript alterations are completed and accurately documented before your Degree Audit is finalized. You and your advisor should initiate these changes early to give the Registrar's Office sufficient time to verify the accuracy of your records.

## What Will Your Advisor Do?

At SKC, students receive advising from faculty members. Each student is assigned an advisor based on the student's declared major. Your advisor is an important part of your educational pathway. You can consider your advisor the "go to" person when you need support and guidance.

Your advisor will have regular office hours that provide times for meetings. You may also contact your advisor via email or use their office phone number. Many advisors will ask you to set up an appointment for quarterly academic advising. However, if you want to talk to your advisor between regular appointments, you can drop in during office hours, email, or call to request an appointment.

Your advisor will provide the following assistance:

As you start at SKC, your advisor may ask questions about your career goals and factors that may affect your success, such as employment, housing, and child or eldercare. Based on your responses, your advisor may recommend SKC resources such as the Career Center, the SKC Housing Office, the Student Support Services (TRIO) Program, or others. During the first meeting, your advisor will help you register for courses in your major. Your advisor will also show you the curriculum plan for your major and discuss any other concerns you may have.

Before each new academic quarter, you will meet with your advisor to review your success in current coursework and discuss courses needed for the next quarter so you stay on track with your curriculum plan. Your advisor will help guide you toward graduation. However, ultimately, it is your

responsibility to track your academic progress toward graduation.

You will also visit with your advisor for the following reasons:

- If you need to add or withdraw from a course.
- To complete graduation paperwork.
- To discuss support available if you are having difficulty with a particular course.

In addition to these roles, your advisor may check in with you about your developing career plans. Your advisor may have information about internships or work study positions that would help you build your resume. Advisors also may write letters of recommendation for scholarships or employment. Advisors are also aware of campus and community supports and will refer you to these supports if you are experiencing difficulties with issues such as food security or mental health.

If you change majors, you will be assigned an advisor in your new program.



## Policies to Know

### Student Code of Conduct

The Student Code of Conduct and Misconduct Procedures provides information about student rights and responsibilities, academic misconduct, plagiarism, and other important information.

SKC values integrity, respect, and the community of learners that make up our student body. In the spirit of these values, we expect that you adhere to the **Code of Conduct**, which reflects the values of the College.

### Academic Integrity

You are expected to maintain academic integrity. The following are guidelines to assist you in observing academic integrity:

- You must do your own work and submit only your work on examinations, reports, and projects, unless otherwise permitted by the instructor.
- You are encouraged to contact your instructor about appropriate citation guidelines.
- You may benefit from working in groups. However, you must not collaborate or cooperate with others on graded assignments, examinations, or other academic exercises unless directed to do so by the instructor.
- You must follow all written and/or verbal instructions given by instructors or designated college representatives prior to taking examinations, placement assessments, tests, quizzes, and evaluations.

- You are responsible for adhering to course requirements as specified by the instructor in the course syllabus.

SKC has a specific [Plagiarism Policy](#) that provides definitions and examples of plagiarism and possible consequences.

### Artificial Intelligence (AI) Applications

Salish Kootenai College places a high value on academic honesty within its campus community. Students are expected to uphold academic integrity by avoiding acts of plagiarism, which is defined as presenting the work of others as one's own without proper acknowledgment of the original source. This definition also includes presenting one's own previous work without proper citation. Given the evolving landscape of academic tools, the use of generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) Chatbots, such as ChatGPT, or other AI applications including Google Gemini (available through SKC Google Apps), falls under the scope of plagiarism if used inappropriately or to submit work not composed by oneself. Instructors will set individual expectations for AI tool usage within their specific courses, and students are responsible for adhering to these course requirements as specified in the course syllabus.

**Crucially, students must never place culturally sensitive data or information into any AI application, including Google Gemini, to ensure the protection and privacy of such data.** Students are encouraged to contact their instructors about appropriate citation guidelines and to utilize the SKC Writing Center for questions, support, and further education to avoid plagiarism.

## **Drug Free Schools and Communities Act**

In accordance with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of alcohol and illicit drugs by SKC employees and students on college property or any college activity is prohibited. SKC will uphold the Standards of Conduct below.

Violations of this policy will result in disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion, and may have serious legal consequences. Information regarding health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and alcohol, as well as alcohol counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation programs, is available through the SKC Counseling Department and the SKC Disability Coordinator.

SKC is an Alcohol and Drug-Free Campus. Alcohol and Drug Free is defined to include all food and beverages containing alcohol in open or unopened containers as well as any

form of tobacco, electronic cigarettes, marijuana, and any drug defined as illegal in the State of Montana. This includes medical marijuana, which is not recognized as legal on the Flathead Reservation.

If you have questions about alcohol or drug use and need counseling, treatment or rehabilitation programs, information is available through the Center for Prevention and Wellness.

## **Tobacco and Smoking Policy**

Smoking tobacco or related products is prohibited in all college buildings, including classrooms, lobbies, office spaces, restrooms, student residences, recreational, athletic facilities, and college-owned vehicles. Smoking is permitted outdoors at a distance of 25 feet or more from any building entrance or exit, HVAC system, and window and more than 50 feet from any area where flammable materials are handled or stored. The use of e-cigarettes and smokeless tobacco is prohibited in all college facilities and vehicles. Anyone who chooses to smoke or use smokeless tobacco where permitted on campus must properly discard the waste.

The use of tobacco in connection with the practice of cultural activities by American Indians is an exception to the above policy. This exception must be approved by the Vice President of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs or designee. Reasonable advance notice of three (3) days should be provided for such review.

## **Safety and Security on Campus**

SKC strives to provide a safe and healthy environment that enhances learning. Each student and employee should be able to attend classes, work on campus, and/or



participate in activities with a feeling that they are safe and secure.

The College provides all prospective students and SKC employees with the campus security policies and procedures and the most recent campus crime statistics. This is part of Federal Law No.101-542, the Student Right-to-Know, and the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1999 (formerly the Campus Security Act of 1990).

### **Hazing**

Salish Kootenai College prohibits hazing. "Hazing" means any intentional, knowing, or reckless act committed by a student, whether individually or in concert with other persons, against another student, and in which both of the following apply:

1. The act was committed in connection with recruitment, an initiation into, an affiliation with, or the maintenance of membership in any organization that is affiliated with the College; and
2. The act contributes to a substantial risk of potential physical injury, mental harm, or personal degradation; or causes physical injury, mental harm, or personal degradation — even if the conduct appears minor, harmless, or is willingly participated in.

Hazing includes any activity expected of someone in joining or participating in a group that humiliates, degrades, abuses, or endangers them, regardless of the person's willingness to participate.

### **Consequences for Hazing**

Hazing may result in serious individual and/or group consequences including, but not limited to: disciplinary action up to and including expulsion for individuals and permanent loss of recognition for groups. Any individual who plans or intentionally assists in hazing activity has engaged in hazing, regardless of whether that individual is present when the hazing activity occurs.

1. All students must take reasonable measures within the scope of their individual authority to prevent violations of this statement.

## Safety and Security on Campus

**For emergencies including health, fire, or police, please call 911.**

SKC Security Officers are on duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They are not law officers and cannot apprehend individuals. Security Officers will call CSKT Tribal Police or other law enforcement or emergency responders as necessary.

SKC Security can assist with the following:

- Temporary and yearly parking permits for students in SKC Housing
- Vehicle jumpstarts
- Lock out assistance
- Building and housing security

- Emergency assistance
- Reporting safety problems
- Escort services for students who do not feel safe leaving a building (for instance, leaving the library at night)
- Victims of stalking or persons with restraining orders against another party are strongly encouraged to notify the SKC Security Department of the threat and to provide Security with a copy of the restraining order so that campus security may enforce it.

### Notifying Campus of Potential Threats

Timely advisories are made to the campus community about crimes that are reported to SKC Security or local law enforcement and may be considered a threat to other students or employees. These reports are made available through the RAVE Alert system.

All SKC students, faculty or staff who register at [Rave Alert](#) automatically be entered into the RAVE (Emergency Alerts) system. You can opt out of getting emergency notifications by visiting the website and following directions.



## Salish Kootenai College General Education Outcomes and Assessment

What are “general education courses?” They are a set of courses that students take outside of their academic major. All degree and certificate of completion programs have requirements for general education courses built into the curricula.

SKC’s general education courses help students develop knowledge and skills and become more effective life-long learners. Because SKC is a tribal college, general education courses also emphasize the Native American cultures, particularly those of the Salish, Pend d’Oreille, and Kootenai tribes and their histories, cultures, and languages.

SKC has four college-wide learning outcomes known as the “4 Cs”: Critical Thinking, Communication, Cultural Understanding, and Citizenship. You will hear a lot about these outcomes, as they appear in many classes and are highlighted in general education courses.

### **SKC defines the 4 Cs as follows:**

**Critical Thinking:** A self-directed process for refining thought. Critical thinkers validate and reflect on their thinking, consider the validity of information sources, context, and

multiple perspectives, and apply both logic and traditional understandings to make decisions.

**Cultural Understandings:** SKC emphasizes sustaining and perpetuating the living cultural traditions of the Selis, Qlispe, and Ksanka peoples.

**Citizenship:** This includes informed and committed participation in the life of one’s community at the local, national, and global levels. Citizens recognize and address community issues, apply ethical and legal knowledge and reasoning, and respect the rights of others.

**Communication:** A clear, respectful sharing of information guided by critical thinking and mindful consideration. Skilled communicators connect with people through spoken, written, and media methods that effectively convey content knowledge and individual values.

SKC assesses student learning in many ways. Assessment provides the College with a means to determine whether students are learning the expected knowledge and skills to become competent in their chosen field of study or career. Documentation of assessment processes and results is an important part of SKC’s continuous efforts to improve student learning.
